a large natural elevation of the earth's surface rising abruptly from the surrounding level; a large steep hill.	Mountain
a large area covered chiefly with trees and undergrowth	Forest
the expanse of salt water that covers most of the earth's surface and surrounds its land masses	Sea
a very large expanse of sea, in particular each of the main areas into which the sea is divided geographically.	Ocean
a steep rock face, especially at the edge of the sea.	Cliff
a mountain or hill, typically conical, having a crater or vent through which lava, rock fragments, hot vapour, and gas are or have been erupted from the earth's crust.	Volcano
a naturally raised area of land, not as high or craggy as a mountain.	Hill

plants considered collectively, especially those found in a particular area or habitat.	Vegetation
a large naturally occurring community of flora and fauna (plants and animals) occupying a major habitat, e.g. forest or tundra.	Biome
the upper layer of earth in which plants grow, a black or dark brown material typically consisting of a mixture of organic remains, clay, and rock particles.	Soil
Plant life as a whole within a certain. area. An area of the planet. characterised by certain flora.	Vegetation Belt
a sudden violent shaking of the ground, typically causing great destruction, as a result of movements within the earth's crust or volcanic action.	Earthquake
a large natural stream of water flowing in a channel to the sea, a lake, or another river.	River
each of the four divisions of the year (spring, summer, autumn, and winter)	Seasons
the state of the atmosphere at a particular place and time as regards heat, cloudiness, dryness, sunshine, wind, rain, etc.	Weather
a low area of land between hills or mountains, typically with a river or stream flowing through it.	Valley
the part of the land adjoining or near the sea.	Coast

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
