Still thinking about hinting things, today, I'd like you to think of ways you could show a reader things, rather than tell them. I've included three examples – you need to complete the table. Try to avoid writing more than a sentence or two for each idea, but you might be able to think of more than one way for each meaning. Start with one idea for each and go back and add more if you can think of them. I'll share some of the best in a lesson coming up. When you've had a go, read the example answers carefully and try to work out why they show the hinted meaning.

inferred (hinted) meaning	how authors might show it
It was cold.	They put extra jumpers on, as well as their coats, hats and scarves.
It began to rain.	I put my umbrella up quickly.
She'd hurt her head.	
She was nervous.	
He wanted to eat the fruit.	
He had a good idea.	
They didn't want to be seen.	
He was scared of the wolf.	
She was not scared of the wolf.
